

#### MINISTER'S LETTER

### Winds of change

As I write (29<sup>th</sup> of March – what is now non-Brexit day) a couple of weeks before you will receive this Lych Gate magazine, there is much exasperation and perhaps even despair in the air. There are demands for change in how things are done and run, but no one seems exactly clear what kind of change is required and how it will come out in the wash. Change will undoubtedly lead to resistance and the question is if it will get sufficient support to pass. Some will worry the proposed changes go too far, others that they don't go far enough...

And I wasn't talking about Brexit! Last year a Strategic Plan was presented to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland and unceremoniously thrown out by the gathered commissioners. They felt that the 10 year Strategic Plan lacked the degree of urgency and concreteness required to address the current 'crisis' in the Church (such as record levels of vacancies, dwindling congregations, too many historic buildings to be looked after by too few people, lack of growth and mission etc). Instead it was agreed that a special commission be tasked with writing a Radical Action Plan, to be presented to the General Assembly of 2019.

Action Plan are now starting to become clear. The overall direction of travel seems to be to devolve power and money from the national centre in order to better resource the regional (i.e. presbyteries), so as to free up and support the local (i.e. congregations) for mission and worship. However, the presbyteries are set to become much larger (numbers to be reduced over time to around 12). The other things which are being considered (but for which there are no firm proposals vet) is how the Mission and Ministries contributions that congregations pay, should be worked out going forward. There is a sense that the present system discourages congregations to increase their giving as any increase will lead to a greater M and M contribution. Overall the intention is that more resources should be freed up locally and regionally to engage in new mission experiments, as well as support those smaller congregations that still have a key role to missional role to play (for example in rural areas). This year I will be a commissioner to the General Assembly and I'm much looking forward to this week (18<sup>th</sup> to 24<sup>th</sup> of May). I believe much and transformed life to his Church. structural change is needed in order to facilitate a revitalisation of the Church. However, no amount of planning or restructuring will by

itself bring about new spiritual growth in the Church. This can only come from God, through the gospel of Jesus Christ taking hold in people's lives. Unless each one of us -who consider ourselves 'church members'- is prepared to be a true follower of and witness to Jesus Christ, any Radical Action Plan is like to be merely an exercise in rearranging the deckchairs on the Titanic. True followers of Christ are continually changed and challenged by the Holy Spirit to go out of our comfort zones to speak more openly about the hope that is in us, whilst demonstrating God's love for the world.

Whereas I don't hold out much hope for a timely or satisfactory Brexit resolution, I do hold out hope that the winds of change will effect new life and growth in the Church of Scotland. Because the winds of change that come from the life giving Spirit can and will resurrect dry bones (Ezekiel 37). As we prepare ourselves for Holy Week and Easter, we should remember that resurrection and new life comes after suffering and death. Some ways and forms of doing church might have to die, but God is faithful and will bring new

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## THE HISTORY OF ST MACHAR'S RANFURLY CHURCH.

## Rev A M Shand <u>Aberdeen Press and Journal 14</u> September 1898.

Many friends and well-wishers in Woodlands will be pleased to learn that the Rev Alex M Shand, MA has been appointed assistant to Rev Dr Duncan of the Parish Church, Bridge of Weir. For the past three months Mr Shand has been assisting during the illness of the minister and he has won the respect of the congregation for his acceptable ministrations.

# Paisley & Renfrewshire Gazette 15 April 1899

Presentation of Colours to the Boys' Brigade. – An interesting ceremony took place at the parade of the 1<sup>st</sup> Houston and Bridge of Weir Company of the Boys Brigade in the Parish Church Hall on Tuesday evening. There was a full muster of the Company, under the command of Captain J Hanna Watson, Houston and the other officers on parade were Captain G M Crawford, Bridge of Weir; Lieutenants, Grieve, Galloway and Barr and the Rev A M Shand, M.A, Chaplain. After a few preliminary movements, the boys were drawn up in review order and the ceremony of "trooping the colours" was gone through, the old Union Jack being received with the general salute while the band played the National Anthem. Miss Elma Armstrong, Drybryne, gracefully presented the new flag to Lieutenant Galloway and expressed her wishes for the continued prosperity of the Brigade.

# Aberdeen Press and Journal 10 July 1899

The committee of nineteen appointed in connection with the vacancy in Bridge of Weir Parish Church, caused by the death of Rev Dr Duncan, minister of the charge, has unanimously recommended to the congregation for election the Rev Alex M Shand, BD., the assistant to Dr Duncan. Voting for or against this gentleman will take place tomorrow. Mr Shand, who is a son of the late Mr Shand, Woodside Paper Works, graduated in arts at Aberdeen and in divinity at Glasgow.

The Scotsman 28 July 1899

At Bridge of Weir on Wednesday the Presbytery met in The Parish Church Bridge of Weir in connection with the call to Rev A M **Shand** to fill the vacancy in the parish caused by the death of Rev Dr Duncan in May last. Rev Mr Dalgetty, Paisley was Moderator. Mr Shand was present and formally accepted the call which was about 400 signatures. The Ordination and Induction was fixed by September 8<sup>th</sup>. Mr Shand was the late Dr Duncan's Assistant for over a year and when the members voted a few weeks ago for or against him. He received 169 votes and only 5 against his election of a membership of over

### Aberdeen Press and Journal 11 September 1899 Rev A. M Shand.

On Friday afternoon, the Rev. Alexander Mason Shand, M.A., was formally ordained to the ministry and inducted to the charge of Bridge of Weir Parish Church, rendered vacant by the death of the Rev. Thomas Duncan, D.D. Mr Shand, who is a native of Woodside, acted as assistant in the Church for a year, and was unanimously elected to the vacancy without a contest. The ceremony took place in the church and was witnessed by a large turnout of the congregation. A Dinner afterwards took place in the Ranfurly Hotel and was largely attended. The Chair was occupied by Mr A S Mories and among others present were the Rev. John Fairlie, Woodside; Mr G F Duthie, Woodside; and Mr A R Wilson, Aberdeen.

The Chairman, after dinner proposed the toast of "The Queen" and then gave that of "Our New Minister." During the twelve months Mr Shand was assisting Dr Duncan they had found him in the true discharge of his duties and recognised in him the faculty of individuality. (Applause) In the name of those present he welcomed Mr Shand as their minister and promised him every support in the work that lay before him. (Applause)

Rev A M Shand, who was enthusiastically received, cordially

thanked the company for the hearty welcome they had accorded him. It was an honour for any young minister might be proud of. While he appreciated the honour highly, he still more highly appreciated the honour the Congregational Committee had conferred on him in unanimously appointing him their minister. He regarded that as the greatest compliment he had ever received and he trusted he might prove himself worthy of the confidence the people of Bridge of Weir had placed in him. (Applause) While assistant in the church he did not expect to become parish minister of Bridge of Weir, but it would be a stimulus to him to think he had come amongst them at their own request.

He hoped that he would remain there for a long time and that he might prove a worthy successor to Dr Duncan. Whether he met with the approbation of every man or not was of little importance to him. He should not be worthy of the church which John Knox and Andrew Melville were connected if he were to fear the face of any man. (Applause) While he tried to win the hearts of the congregation, he would preach what he believed to be the truth. He hoped the friendships that had begun that day would long continue, that he would be their friend as well as minister and that the friendship would be of that kind which time would only serve to mellow. (Applause) Several other toasts followed. In the evening a conversazione was held in the church. Rev A Abernethy presided over an audience that filled the building. The chief item on the programme was the presentation of robes and books to the new minister. Mr Shand, who was very enthusiastically received, cordially thanked the congregation for the welcome they had given him. He had heard a good deal about himself that day and he hoped he might live to deserve one half of what had been said in his praise. He valued the gifts that had been presented to him and trusted he would make good use of them. He

## **EASTER WITHOUT THE CRUCIFIXION?**

I recently heard of a church minister being asked to speak about Easter to a primary school assembly, but without mentioning the crucifixion. Now I don't know how they got themselves out of that particular conundrum, but it can't have been easy. It doesn't make much sense to celebrate and speak of new life and resurrection, if we've wiped out all traces of death and suffering. The joyful news that Christians celebrate at Easter comes as a surprising reality following the indisputable death of Jesus on the cross three days earlier. That horrible, unjust and excruciating death he suffered on what is referred to as Good Friday. Of course, is does not make obvious sense to call and remember such a day as 'Good Friday'. And it does make sense to not want children to dwell on

the ins and outs of Roman torture and execution methods. And yet, we can't have a true Easter without Good Friday. There is no resurrection without the death of Jesus.

The reason Christians call Good Friday 'good', is because paradoxically on this most horrible of days, Jesus has taken on our last enemy; 'death itself'. The one 'who must not be named'. Our culture does not like to talk about death or our own mortality. We try to avoid facing up to the reality of aging, suffering and death. Jesus didn't – he was clear that his chosen mission in life would result in death. But he also trusted that God the Father would bring him -through deathvictorious into new life. Proving that God's new creation is

Easter arguably the most joyous and hope giving festival of the Christian year. Death is overcome, sins forgiven, hope – with Jesus- alive.

### Paisley and Renfrewshire Gazette 17 March 1906.

School Board: The two representatives from Bridge of Weir on the Kilbarchan School Board will give an account of their stewardship on Thursday next, 22 March. Little or no interest is shown in the matter probably because the ratepayers were satisfied with their representatives. The Rev A M Shand, M.A., and Mr. J.G. Frew have efficiently discharged three years and as they are eligible for re-election are worthy of being returned for another term of office. Presentation to Parish Church: At the close of Sheriff Lyell's Lecture on Monday night, the Rev A M. Shand took the opportunity, on behalf of the subscribers, to present Mr Robert Houston with a purse of sovereigns. Mr Houston had filled the office of beadle for a number of years and was now leaving the district to become a farmer. His duties as church officer brought him in close contact with minister and Mr Shand could therefore speak of him with more

intimate knowledge than most people. Mr Houston's faithful and personal appreciation and also the respect and esteem of everyone with whom he came in contact.

## Paisley & Renfrewshire Gazette 24 March 1906.

School Board: The Bridge of Weir representatives on the Kilbarchan School Board – the Rev A.M. Shand and Mr J.G. Frew – will address a meeting of the ratepayers on Thursday 29 March in the Public School at 8pm, when Major R S Milne will take the chair. It is expected that they will speak on educational affairs generally, with perhaps special reference to the new draft regulations for the training of teachers and probably the proposed socialistic schemes for providing free dinners, etc., for school children will come under review. Questions will be invited, and a lively and interesting meeting is anticipated.

## Paisley and Renfrewshire Gazette 30 November 1907.

Presentation to Rev A M Shand
On Friday evening 22<sup>nd</sup> instant, the Parish Church Hall was filled to overflowing by members of the congregation and friends to do honour to their minister and to present him with pulpit robes, a gold watch and chain, and a roll-top desk. Major R S Milne presided and was accompanied on the platform by the kirk session and managers, along with Rev. John Crouch and Rev Adam Wilson. The opening Psalm having been sung, the Rev John Crouch asked blessing, after which tea was served.

The Chairman said this was an extremely interesting occasion, designed for the encouragement of their minister and to show that he was beloved and appreciated by his people. Mr Shand was an Aberdonian and he (the Chairman) might claim kinship. It was said that Aberdonians had their head screwed on the right way, (Laughter). He expressed, on behalf of the congregation, the high esteem which Mr Shand has earned during his term of ministry extending over the past eight years and he was sure the good feeling which had supported him in the

past would continue to assist him to carry on his labours in our midst in the years to come. (applause) He called upon Mr Pollock to introduce Mrs Milner, who would present the robes.

Mr R Pollock said he had great honour in introducing the lady who was the mainspring in the movement- though some of them might think it strange that a lady should be asked to robe Mr Shand. (laughter)

Mrs Milne of Royston, gracefully performed the ceremony, expressing the good wishes of the congregation, hoping he would have good health to wear it out. They would be glad to present him with many more. (Applause) Mr James Purdie, in presenting a gold watch, suitably inscribed and a handsome oak roll-top desk, said it had fallen to his lot to make this presentation as the oldest member of the congregation. There were very few left of the original congregation now.

There were very few Established Church people in Bridge of Weir before the railway was made. They met at that time in a hall which was situated behind Rankin's Land, but when the railway came the hall was removed. Subsequently they met in the Freeland School and were ministered to in those days by Dr Graham of Kilbarchan and Dr McLaren of Houston, who officiated every alternative Sabbath day. The late Dr Turner and Mr W Harvey (Ravenswood) were active members then, and when people became numerous enough, they decided to form a congregation and as a result the present church was built. Their first minister was Rev Robert Turnbull, now minister of Barrowfield Parish Church, Glasgow. Then followed Dr Duncan whom many remember lovingly and he in turn was followed by their present minister, Mr Shand. He (Mr Purdie) was convenor of the committee on that occasion and a pleasant task it was. There was only one name submitted and the committee meetings were cordial

His sermons always conveyed a message to his hearers. (Applause) Of course no one was perfect. (Laughter) Mr Shand had his faults and, he might say, misfortunes. (Laughter) They had been told he came from Aberdeen. Mr Shand could say -Though I was born in Aberdeen. Yet I am stationed here; Although I love my native town I'm fond of Bridge of Weir (laughter and applause) Mr William Campbell was the next speaker. He said he had been asked to take the place of Mr W G Reid. They all knew the sad circumstances which rendered Mr Reid's presence tonight a trying ordeal. The late amicable and devoted Mrs Reid had been president of the Women's Guild and was active in the congregation. Her loss every one of them deplored. He had therefore consented to act as Mr Reid's substitute in introducing the president of the Women's Guild. He was told of this two days ago and he fancied it would have been merely a word or two that was required. He got a great shock when he came to the meeting and discovered his name on the programme. It was difficult, indeed, to follow in the steps of his saintly predecessor, Dr Duncan. He recounted many of the cheering things he had heard and encountered during his eight years ministry in Bridge of Weir. He had been assisted in every way by the elders and managers and all others engaged in the work of the

agencies and institutions of the

church. Down to the beadle who had recently left and the present one, all had shown him every kindness possible and he had been greatly assisted. He thanked them one and all. (Applause) The minister of the Ranfurly U.F. Church, Rev. Adam Wilson, was present and gave a humorous address. He said these presentations gave him great pleasure. Holiday Closing of Churches; Criticism at Paisley.

At the meeting of the Presbytery of Paisley yesterday, the report of the **Business Committee in the** question of the closing of churches during the holidays in summer was

from Rev A.M. Shand of Bridge of Weir. The Rev John Muir presented the report, in which it was said that Kirk Sessions were acting within their rights in closing on one or more Sundays during the session. The Rev A.M. Shand described the closing of churches as deplorable laxity. He felt that it was very much against the prestige of the Church of Scotland and they aught to take steps to put and end to that state of At a nursing home in Aberdeen on matters. They never heard of the Roman catholic Churches or the Anglican Churches being closed on the Lord's Day. He moved that they enjoin ministers to see that there is at least one service in every parish church on the Lord's Day. On a vote being taken 21 voted for the Business Committee's recommendation and 11 for Mr Shand's amendment.

## The Scotsman: 10 April 1929.

Fewer Bible classes.

Reporting on the work of the Instruction of Youth Committee, the Rev A.M. Shand, Bridge of Weir, stated that the decrease in the number of scholars on the roll of Sunday schools which had been recorded during the past two years still continued. There were approximately 75,000 scholars, which was 1,576 fewer than in the previous year. The decreasing figures in recent years was also enrolment was compulsory, and he believed that the reason was due to the curve in the birth-rate in 1921 and it was not likely that the former attendances would be attained until 1930-31. It was gratifying to report that there were more workers, the figures being 6,600 women and 3,000 men. With regard to Bible classes, there was an overall decrease of 22 classes. In the Presbytery of Glasgow alone there were 24 fewer Bible classes and he thought the reason might be due to the abnormal number of vacant churches, resulting in classes being dropped. The total offerings in Sunday schools and Bible classes amounted to £10,123, half of which was devoted to maintenance, a quarter went to schemes of the Church and the remaining quarter had gone to various

philanthropic bodies not directly connected with the Church.
