

#### LETTER FROM THE MINISTER

### Presbytery mission planning

What is going on? Not everyone might be aware but this year all presbyteries need to come up with new 'presbytery mission plans' that allow for a 40% reduction in full time ministry posts by the end of 2025. The national target figure is 600 and includes 120 posts for centrally paid MDS (ministry development staff) personnel. This reorganisation includes a proportionately even greater reduction in the number of ministers of word and sacrament (480). In order to achieve this reduction which is motivated by the expected availability of both people and finances, a great number of congregations will need to unite or be served differently by ministers and MDS staff.

These figures have been agreed by the General Assembly of 2021 and since then all existing presbytery plans have been suspended and during this year all existing vacancies have been sisted, which means that they are not permitted to call a minister. This is to give the presbyteries time to create their new plans by the end of this year.

at the moment of writing I have not yet heard when this will take place.

Our own Kirk Session had had a meeting ahead of the presbytery conference to discuss matters (as we have done on a number of occasions but without specifics (such as number of FT posts available for our area) it hard to know what to suggest or expect.

In our presbytery in September of last year a new mission planning task group has been created and they have asked all congregation to submit a mission audit — which we did in early January. These are being considered by the task group. A building audit of all churches and halls across the presbytery is also taking place as we speak.

Initially it was hoped that by the end of February there would be a draft plan to be discussed at a dedicated presbytery conference at the start of March. The conference did go ahead, and was held in person, which made for a nice change. However, a draft plan was not yet available at that

stage and instead we had discussions in our local mission area grouping. Our local mission area covers Kilbarchan including Lochwinnoch area, Bridge of Weir, Kilmacolm, Houston and Linwood. Per church the minister and two other representatives were invited to take part, however due to illness (mostly Covid) and colleagues having to convene other area groups, I was the only minister at our area group. Although it was interesting to share some initial conversation, I felt it didn't take us a whole lot further forward as it was hard to hear each other in the busy hall and there were no concrete proposals on the table as to how to share ministry across the area. There is to be another local mission area meeting where these things are taken further forward, but yet heard when this will take place. Our own Kirk Session had had a meeting ahead of the presbytery conference to discuss matters (as we have done on a number of occasions) but without specifics (such as number of FT posts available for our area) it is hard to know what to suggest or

A proposed union in Kilmacolm has fallen through at the moment due to one of the congregations voting against it (though their kirk session had supported it). So this has now also gone back to the planning committee. A solution will need to be found to allocate and share a proportionate number of ministry posts across our area in a way that encourage mission, rather than spreads it ever more thinly! Team ministry is a word that is mentioned quite often, but how this is done or organised can vary from having a 'super union' with all congregations in an area to appointing ministers for a certain percentage to a their own

parish and for the rest to the wider area. As I have said no specific number has still officially been mentioned, but to my mind (doing the math) a figure of 4 full time posts (not necessarily all ministers) might be available for the formerly 7 separate charges in our area.

What complicated planning is that ministers in an unrestricted charge (the majority are) cannot be 'forced' to go elsewhere but in reality most will have to consider taking on other parish areas or new unions. Ministers in reviewable charges (such as myself) face uncertainty as they can be given 6 months' notice when a review has taken place and presbytery decides to call in the charge. The charge in my case was 7 years reviewable so there are still 2 years left until the review. For everyone up and down the country in the Church of Scotland, this is an unsettling time. For me personally it would be good to have greater clarity about the way ahead. However, it also is a time of waiting and acknowledging that some things are outside one's control. The challenge is to remain outward looking at a time when everything seems to be about 'preservation' of what we think we have. The image of pruning comes to mind -

as Jesus taught his disciples in the hours before his arrest and death: "I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener. He cuts off every branch in me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit he prunes so that it will be even more fruitful". (John 15:1-2) Of course, we naturally resist this kind of pruning because it is painful and unsettling. We have to trust the Gardener even if the pruning shears are in the hands of mere mortals such as ourselves!


## **COVID UPDATE**



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# THE SCOTTISH REGALIA

Mary Taylor's story in the last issue of this publication got me looking through Scott's information regarding this subject. I had come to hate books during my time at school owing to the large amount of homework every night when I was supposed also to read a large volume of Dickens or Scott or the like, as a home reader. In my early thirties a friend had me in the top floor of Smiths bookshop in St. Vincent Street where I bought a book written by Walter Scott. I never looked back. Scott became a great hero. I have produced the following from his letters, copies of which I have. Around 1651 the Scottish Honours were removed to Dunnottar Castle for security. When Cromwell, who determined to punish the Scots for included that the honours should their support of the King, marched his troops to Dunnottar and laid siege, it was thought unlikely that the castle could withstand the English and the regalia was smuggled out by a clergyman's wife under a quantity of hards of lint and was buried under the pulpit at Kinneff Kirk. Wind of this reached the English and the minister (Grainger) and his wife were put to torture which they bravely bore. Ogilvie (the deputy governor of the castle) and his lady were threatened with the utmost extremities by General Morgan, the republican commander, but they stuck to the story that the regalia had been carried away to France. They suffered long imprisonment and

much ill usage.

At the Restoration the old Countess Marischal obtained for her younger son Keith (Dunnottar Castle Governor) the Earldom of Kintore and the post of Knight Marischal with £400 per year pension (more than £80,000 now), as if he had been preserver of the honours, instead of being abroad at the time. Grainger the clergyman would only deliver the regalia to Ogilvie and Ogilvie was made a knight Barnet with a new charter for his lands. The Grangers, with fingers and knees disjointed for keeping the secret, got nothing at all, as Scott says "a goodly medicine for their aching bones".

An article of union in 1707 never be removed from Scotland and their home in Edinburgh Castle. Somehow it became generally averred that regalia had been sent to London and that Scott, amongst others, had seen what purported to be the Crown of Scotland, removed illegally. From Scott's conversations with the Prince Regent in 1815, a commission for the examination of the strong room in Edinburgh Castle was made. Scott's letter of 14th January 1818 to Morrit, his good friend and English MP, notes "our fat friend (the Prince Regent) has remembered a petition which I put to him, and has granted a commission to the officers of state and others to institute a search for the Regalia of Scotland". An

authentic document notes that the regalia must be placed in a strong chest, secured with many locks, and the chest placed in a strongroom which must be carefully bolted up and secured. Scott's letter dated 4th February to his friend Crocker at the Admiralty in London notes "I have the pleasure to assure you that the Regalia of Scotland were this day found in perfect preservation. The Sword of State and Sceptre showed marks of hard usage at some former period". Elsewhere he records "the Sword is a most beautiful piece of workmanship, the scabbard richly decorated with filigree work of silver double gilded representing oak leaves and acorns".

Cromwell had previously destroyed the English regalia, melting the gold forming currency and selling the great jewels. His plan to do the same to Scotland's Honours was frustrated by brave people, the bravest and most damaged receiving nothing for their pains.
