

FROM THE MINISTER

It feels like it is the umpteenth time I have to write we don't have much clarity yet as regards to what the presbytery mission plan will hold in store for us! Since I wrote for the August issue there has been some progress in that our own subcommittee met three times in August to prepare a considered response to the consultation. The Kirk Session met on the 25th August to discuss our conclusions and proposals and agreed with them all. This meeting was open to church members and a number came to hear and contribute to the discussion. On the 31st August the subcommittee met with the consultation group from presbytery to give our response to the draft plan and set out our ideas in mind the usual restrictions and concerns. They are also visiting around tenure etcetera. If this all the other congregations in the surrounding villages. It is possible and likely that they will perhaps organise further meetings, possibly jointly in the next few weeks.

Ultimately this needs to result in a proposal for ministry in our area (and this will include building determinations) that goes towards the big presbytery plan. Once this has been pulled together and agreed by the presbytery planning committee, the whole plan will be presented to presbytery and will be voted on at its November meeting (22^{nd}) . If approved by presbytery this plan will get sent to wise and faithful way forward. **PMPIG** (Presbytery Mission Plan Implementation Group) of Faith Nurture Forum. They have to approve it meets the requirements of the Presbytery Mission Planning Act.

If the plan is approved and adopted, it will over the next five years be put into action – bearing sounds rather vague and abstract, it is, until we know what the plan will entail for us! At this moment in advances God's kingdom on earth. time, I cannot tell you much more about our conversations with the

consultation committee, so as not to prejudice the outcome. However, it is important to note that at this moment in time no decisions have been made or implied about which church buildings are to close or what shape ministry will take in the village in the future. I hope you will trust that the Kirk Session and the sub committee are seeking a good, Please pray for all those involved in drawing up the presbytery mission plan as it is a fiendishly difficult undertaking and a frankly thankless task! We all need to ask ourselves continually what is truly important and faithful to what Christ calls us to be and do. Though we all have our own attachments and preferences, needs and desires, we need to keep surrendering these to a higher calling. Only in this way

Sunday 9 October 2022 is International Chorister Day a celebration of the amazing opportunities that being a chorister provides, at all levels from our great cathedrals to small parish churches. Churches across the UK and rest of the world are being encouraged to be part of this day. Cricketer Alistair Cook, TV & radio presenter Alexander Armstrong, pop stars Britney Spears and Ed Sheeran all spent their formative years singing in their local church choir. As I've said in previous articles many people get their first experience of music in the church and this is something I strive to encourage.

Becoming a chorister is the start of a lifelong journey. It means gaining singing skills and a musical education not to mention inspiring a love of choral music. It doesn't mean that choristers go on to become professional musicians - most do not. But the skills you gain being part of a choir are valuable ones and transfer to a huge range of other disciplines and settings. For example: self-discipline, commitment, teamwork and organisational skills. It can also lead to not only a life-long love of music, but also to long term friendships. Looking back on my life I can certainly say my organisational skills (such as they are) and many of the friendships I have made have come from being part of a choir. Rehearsals resumed for the Junior Choir on the 1 September. Whilst we unfortunately lost two of our previous members who have moved up to High School, another five have joined us and our number has risen to sixteen. It is great to welcome so many enthusiastic young people into the church but also start them off on their musical journey. We had been invited to participate in the Royal School of Church Music's Young Voices Festival which would've seen children's choirs from across central Scotland come together at Perth Cathedral to sing a service entitled *The Water* of Life. Water themed bible readings and music give a nice

structure to this and the music ranges from short African songs, to traditional hymns, American spirituals to short anthems. The untimely death of HM Queen meant this event has been postponed until sometime in 2023. The children have been given their own music book and have enjoyed tackling some of the pieces including Come all you people, Sing of the Lord's goodness and *O healing river.* It is the first time the youngsters have sung from proper, printed music, so we're incorporating some music theory into rehearsals too.
