

FROM THE MINISTER

The draft presbytery plan did not get voted on in November, as this vote was postponed. The latest information at the time of writing is that this voting is to be done on 18th of March. The delay is to enable further consultations in the areas where the plan met with most resistance, however in the meantime vacancies cannot be progressed and many congregations are left in limbo, which is unfortunate and committee has seen some personnel changes in the past few months as it is a very demanding, difficult and time-consuming process for those involved. It can be hard at times to deny the impression that we are rearranging deck chairs on the Titanic, however in more concrete missional collaborations it is actually energising to see how we can be better together. Just before Christmas we were able to jointly host the Christmas Unwrapped programme for the P6 pupils of

Bridge of Weir primary school (at Freeland Church) and we all had a great time. The children and their teachers were very enthusiastic. We are hoping to put on the Easter Code programme later in March for the P7s and this might take place in our building. We have also begun working at worship and local outreach ideas for Holy Week and Easter. As far as the weekly services go we have now got into the Women's Lectionary and it's been interesting to focus on (mainly) the figure of Mary, the mother of Jesus, during the last wee while. 

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FROM THE ORGAN LOFT



In my spare time I review CDs and sheet music for the Royal School of Church Music's magazine: Church Music Quarterly. It's always an interesting wait wondering what is going to come my way. Especially when it comes to CDs. There's always a nice variety of stuff to explore. Most excitingly I get to enjoy some of the country's top Cathedral Choirs and organ recitals from around the world which are usually of superb quality as well as featuring lots of good music.

There have been organ recitals from organists of the other end of the virtuosic scale too including one who insists on bringing their dog to the recording sessions! If you listen very carefully you can usually hear the dog shifting in the organ loft! I have roughly one hundred and fifty words per disc which can present something of a challenge. The reviews editor always asks if I'm happy with what he's selected for me. I don't tend to reject anything as I feel it stands me in good stead to put in a request if I see something good coming out in the horizon!

There was recently a disc of music by an American chap called Gerre Hancock – whose arrangement of *Infant Holy, Infant Lowly* our choirs sang over Christmas. Gerre Hancock was organist and choirmaster of St. Thomas Fifth Avenue in New York. More famous as an organist and improvisor, he was a well-renowned choir trainer in the USA as well as a little known as a composer and arranger. I requested this CD and lo and behold it came along. I've since purchased his book on improvisation and I'm a big fan of his compositions. It's a shame he's little-known this side of the Atlantic. I must confess I've never been to New York, let alone St. Thomas Fifth Avenue, but I've since received a couple of CDs from there to review. Their music team is all British. A CD of compositions and transcriptions of British composers was rather bombastic, in my view. However, the next CD was far more interesting.

Bach's Clavier-Übung III is the third of four volumes of keyboard pieces and studies, but (strangely) is the only one volume he composed specifically for the organ. The debate in the sleeve notes was focussed on whether or not Bach intended these pieces to be played as a set or intended this as an anthology which the performer can dip in an out of. The keyboard pieces are interspersed with the Choir of St Thomas singing some of Bach's chorale settings. The music is exceptionally well played by Jeremy Filsell (the Director of Music) and sung by the choir. However, two things stood out. One was the sub-title of the disc. Jeremy Filsell plays the organs of Saint Thomas Church. I had a double take! Yes, this church has five pipe organs (of varying sizes) in the building. Ranging from the Miller-Scott Chancel Organ of four manuals (keyboards) and the Loening-Hancock Gallery Organ. It would appear both organs are in the sanctuary of the church but at opposite ends of the building. There's a smaller choir room organ in the choir room, a practice organ and a small chamber organ for use in early compositions in the church. Each has its own history and would appear to be fairly significant. However, it does seem quite incredible that any church has this many organs. The tuning bill must by sky high!

More and more CD labels now seem to be acknowledging the performers by name and the members of the choir at St. Thomas are listed. Rather amusingly, there is a group of choristers called "Non-singing choristers". I'm not quite sure what they do. My guess is they are boys whose voices may be breaking or have been accepted as choristers but still on probation and not quite ready to sing with the choir as yet. Personally, I'd rather encourage singing choristers but that's maybe just me!

It's an interesting business writing reviews, and certainly both discs I've mentioned are worth getting but it's certainly interesting to learn about how things are done across the pond!

Members of the congregation have shown great support for a number of local charities through retiring collections and attendance at The Terrace lunch club.

The retiring collection after the Harvest Festival Service raised £225 for the Renfrewshire Foodbank, while the collections at the Christmas Services raised £539 for Aberlour Poverty Relief Appeal.

The Terrace lunches which resumed this year were very successful, and as a result £435 was shared between Adams House specialist dementia care home in Elderslie, and Rays of Hope who provide cancer support in Johnstone.

CRIMOND CHURCH



On travelling from Peterhead to Inverness at the weekend we reached the village of Crimond. Both of us remarked that we only knew the name from singing the psalm "The Lord's my Shepherd"

On researching the Church we found the following information:

The earliest recorded date of a Christian Community in Crimond is 1262, although there must have been Christians in this part of the country much earlier than this because of the activities of the followers of St Columba, — St Fergus and St Drostan — known to be in the area and because a chapel at Rattray dedicated to the Virgin Mary was founded there at an early date, possibly, 811 AD, although it has been said this could have been earlier. At first there was no resident Minister, Crimond being supplied from Aberdeen, but in 1567 George Nesbit, Reader, was appointed to the Parish and was in charge until 1573.

In 1574 Alexander Keith was appointed Minister and in 1576 the first known Church was built, that date having been above one of its doors. The Church stood within the graveyard but all that now remains is a portion of the South wall and part of a neat ornamental stone cornice which is built into the churchyard wall. On the cornice in bold letters is the text:-

"For in Thy courts one day excels a thousand others have" (Psalm 84 v. 10)

The present Church erected in 1812 and substantially renovated in 1895 stands near the main road at a distance of above half a mile from the old Church. In the West End is a steeple containing a clock, presented by James Laing of Haddo (Crimond) and Streatham Hill,

Surrey, a native of the parish. This was taken from the farmhouse at Haddo and the spot from where the clock was removed can still be seen today. Crimond Clock which bears the text — "The Hour's Coming" was famous for having, as a result of an error, 61 minutes. In 1949 when the clock was being repainted the extra minute was removed, but this caused such a furore that the extra minute was restored. In February 1994 the mechanism of the clock was electrified. The original movement of the clock is displayed in the Church in memory of the late Councillor Norman Cowie OBE.

Crimond Church has become famous because Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II chose the tune "Crimond" to be sung at her wedding. "Crimond" was composed by Ms Jessie Seymour Irvine (called Seymour) a daughter of Dr Irvine, Minister if the Parish. Ms Irvine was very musical and along with a number of other young ladies attended a class for organists at Banff. One of the exercises required of them was to compose a Psalm tune. "Crimond" was Ms Irvine's effort. It was first performed at an evening service in Auchterless Church but Ms Irvine was not happy with the harmonisation of it. Mr David Grant, a fine musician from Aberdeen, was present at the service and she asked him to harmonise it for her. Consequently he was credited with having composed it. The Church has now rectified the mistake, with the credit going to the originator, Ms Irvine.

At the back of the Church there are 4 etched glass panels to commemorate the 23rd Psalm to the tune "Crimond"
