

JOINT MEETING WITH ELDERS FROM FREELAND AND ST MACHAR'S RANFURLY CHURCH

Elders from both churches met on 16th May in Freeland Church Hall to discuss hopes and fears, challenges and opportunities moving towards a joint future. Our meeting was led by Rev Maggie McArthur, minster of Cardross Parish Church. She made clear that she was there at our request and not on behalf of presbytery to lead any formal negotiations. We (the respective kirk sessions) want to use the current period prior to any more formal moves towards a union in the most constructive way. Elders were arranged in small groups with a balance of elders from each church per group. After a devotional by the Rev McArthur, the first conversation round was sharing hopes and fears regarding a future union. After a period of time the tables fed back to the whole group.

Some of the hopes expressed by the groups were: one new united church for the village; combining of resources and volunteers; sum being greater than its parts; renewed energy and positive outlook; a positive union being good publicity; attracting more people to a stronger church. Some of the fears expressed were; protracted process/bureaucracy getting to a union; losing members in process; division and conflict which would be bad publicity for the church; loss of identity; St Machar's Ranfurly congregation feeling like it's a take over; loss of community space. We then started a round of conversation around the challenges and opportunities that a future united church might have. Again feedback to the whole group was given. Some of the challenges that were mentioned; ageing profile of church members and volunteers; creating a new identity that can be a home for all; connecting better with the village; growing the church!

Opportunities that were identified: fresh expressions of church; refurnishing church building and/or halls for new congregation. Both ministers were present but not taking part in the table conversations or the feedback rounds. This is not intended to be a

comprehensive report of the evening. The facilitator will be writing a report for the Sessions and we will be having another joint meeting on June 13th. The plan for this meeting is to

establish joint task groups who will begin exploring and working on areas where we can do so. We do this already in mission and outreach; as well as school chaplaincy and shared worship services. There are other areas where we can do more together, even before a union and this will hopefully create a good foundation for moving forward. One challenge recognised on the night was the need for clear communication at all levels including with our members and the rest of the village. The way we talk about the future will impact on whether it will be perceived as good or bad news. We all know that often church unions can go badly and create a lot of conflict, which ultimately damages the reputation of the church in the community. Whilst we want to honestly acknowledge differences and losses, we were all agreed that we hope to create a good and strong union. Everyone has a role to play in this regard. Keep an eye out for the weekly email newsletters for further updates following our joint meeting on the 13th of June. It is likely that we will be inviting non-elders onto the task groups. Hanneke


SUMMER PLACEMENT **AARON MARSHALL**

FROM THE ORGAN LOFT



Many of us will have watched the coronation of HM King Charles III and Queen Camilla. There were many highlights – the first Coronation of a new monarch in 70 years, Penny Mordaunt and her swords, the various faith groups represented and the music. From a musical point of view at least, I felt the Coronation was a glorified concert. It showed musicians playing and singing at their very best. The Coronation ceremony itself showed church music in a positive light. The Choir of Westminster Abbey alongside their organist and an orchestra of some of the country's top orchestral players, were joined by Cathedral choirs from Truro and Belfast and augmented

further by singers from the Monteverdi Choir. Many people have remarked on the quality of this ensemble, and there is no denying the significance of their contributions. However, this quality is nothing new. These choirs give consistently high performances whether for state occasions, Sunday services or a mid-week evensong attended by a small number of people.

Regardless of the occasion these choirs sing to a high standard on a daily basis. During my postgraduate years in London, I'd often go to services at Westminster Abbey and would try and arrive early to get a seat in the quire. Roughly where Humza Yousaf was sat at the coronation and would watch the Westminster Abbey Choir and their then **Director of Music (James** O' Donnell) in action. It was a masterclass in professionalism, and

music making of the highest quality. The service church musicians give often goes unrecognised or appreciated whether that is top cathedral choir, small parish choir, a praise band or something else. Churches are blessed to have a willing group of people to provide the musical accompaniment to their worship. The Choir at St. Machar's is almost on a par with their Westminster Abbey counterparts (we probably have more fun) and make a valuable contribution to the worship here. The selection of music we sing covers many styles and genres with our choir rising to the challenges of each piece admirably. Whereas a choral society has the luxury of a term to learn a programme of music, church choirs work in a much shorter timescale and the sheer amount of music our choir has covered is as admirable as it is inspiring.

Sunday 11 June 2023 is Music Sunday, a day where churches are encouraged to give thanks and celebrate the musical life of their church and our Gala Concert on the afternoon of Sunday 11 June should do exactly that. I would encourage you to support the choir here and the musical life of this church. Music has the power to connect people to God and has a special power that the spoken word perhaps doesn't. If you enjoy singing, why not consider coming along to the choir on a Thursday night and join us? You don't have to read music. We work hard but have a lot of fun along the way. The choir breaks soon for the summer but rehearsals will begin again on Thursday 17 August at 7.30 p.m. and will begin contributing to the worship again on Sunday 3 September.
