
Our Company Section competitions are down to just our senior boys 5-a-side football team taking part in the second round on 2nd February. Should they get through then they would progress to the Scottish finals.



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From the Organ Loft



For those who keep a note on my attendance at St. Machar's, you perhaps may have noticed I took an extra week's holiday in 2024 and was missing on Sunday 29 December. This wasn't due to the consumption of one mince pie or pig in blanket too many over the festive season but was to attend morning worship at St. Giles' Cathedral in Edinburgh. That Sunday marked the final Sunday of Master of the Music, Michael Harris MBE after twenty eight years of service. Michael had been in post since November 1996. Michael and his wife, Brigitte, had been two of my university lecturers during my undergraduate studies at **Edinburgh Napier** University. Michael is a quiet, unassuming, supportive, clever and extremely talented man. His contribution to church music in Scotland far exceeds what he's often credited with and he leaves a huge legacy. He, and the St Giles' Cathedral Choir perhaps came into their own during the recent death of HM Queen Elizabeth II and subsequent presentation of the

Crown Jewels to HM King Charles III.

Michael was the main lecturer on the 1st year BMus course at Edinburgh Napier University. He steered us through Languages and Structures of Music. His knowledge and enthusiasm for his subject of Edinburgh's famous really shone through, you left his lecturers feeling you still had more to learn, and two hours very quickly flew by. He could've probably delivered all his lectures without notes, and did so when his laptop connected to the overhead projector ran out of juice! He was able to rise above the sniggering of thirty first year undergraduates when he announced the next week's lecture would be on three significant renaissance composers: "Schein, Schütz and Scheidt"! He gave opportunities to his students with many being chosen to augment the St. Giles' choir, given chances to perform with some of the other groups he conducted and I was chosen to play the percussion part in Bernstein's Chichester Psalms. I never held it against him that he didn't let me play the Bösendorfer concert grand piano that the department had when

demonstrating my score

reading skills - he sent

me in the direction of the baby grand at the other side of the room! He also had a very dry sense of humour remarking his surprise that Edinburgh's fleet of electric buses were able to make it up the Mound without breaking down. And saying of the organ at one churches "I'm not playing that thing!"

His legacy at St. Giles' is vast – not just in terms of the worship, but a weekly concert series, various organ recital series, commercial and broadcast recordings, the establishment of a Friends of the Music (a society set up to help support the music department of St. Giles' cathedral and fund specific projects), commissioning several pieces for the St. Giles' songbook marking 900 years of music making at St. Giles'. Out with the cathedral he edited and composed simplified hymn arrangements for beginner organists, was a President of the Edinburgh Society of Organists, and was the driving force behind singing returning to churches in the aftermath of the Covid pandemic. You could tell he cared deeply about church music and of St. Giles' in particular. Never one to boast or brag about his

achievements or

successes, he just quietly did his job. All his students were in awe of him and in his own unique way inspired us all. He was always well prepared for whatever lecture, rehearsal or performance he was leading. Twenty eight years at one Cathedral is a huge amount of time and his awarding of the MBE in the New Year Honours list is testament to his service to both St. Giles' and Church Music in Scotland.

It was an honour to have known him and I wish him well in his retirement. His commitment and dedication to his job and his duties is exemplary and should be what other organists/directors of music aspire to.




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Churches of the World
