

What is wise?

Knowledge and wisdom are not the same thing. You can have all the information in the world, but still not know what is the right course of action. It certainly helps to inform yourself widely if you have an important decision to take, but it doesn't necessarily lead (by the time the Lych Gate has directly to a conclusion.

Wisdom is needed. Wisdom requires knowing what is important to you, what values you hold and how to stay true to these. It also requires an ability to think through wider consequences of your actions. You need to be able to consider where a path leads and if you should be going down it.

It is quite hard to define wisdom, although we can usually think of examples in real life. The book of Proverbs in the Bible is what we call 'Wisdom Literature', along with Job, Ecclesiastes and Song of Solomon. I'm hoping to spend some time in this Wisdom literature in the coming months come out I will have made a start with the story of the young king Solomon praying for wisdom to be a good ruler).

According to Proverbs 9:10 the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom (with fear of the Lord both reverence and love are meant). We will discover there is a lot of 'common sense' to be found in the

book of Proverbs, observations from everyday life and nature, but at the same time this wisdom is discernible because of its wise Creator. A humble open attitude towards God and towards the world around us is what is needed to be truly wise.

As we will continue to need to discern the way forward and make decisions about the future, we too need wisdom and not just common sense, but the wisdom of God. Let us earnestly search and pray for this wisdom,

CHURCHES OF THE WORLD

St Mary's Cathedral -Tallinn



This church was originally established by the Danes when they invaded Tallinn in the 13th century and is the oldest church in mainland Estonia. It was originally a Roman Catholic Cathedral and became Lutheran in 1561.

Built originally in wood, it was then replaced with stone when the

Dominican Friars arrived. The monks were killed in a conflict between the Knights of the Sword and supporters of the Pope's legate in 1233 and the church was then desecrated. A letter was sent to Rome asking permission to consecrate it anew and this was then allowed. A great fire in 1684 resulted in the entire wooden furnishings and roof destroyed and many of the stone vaults collapsed. It was rebuilt in

1686.





As I walked in the door it was surprising to hear the organ being played although the church was empty. The tour guide confirmed that the organist came to practise each day at the same time and our tour had been arranged with the church authorities to coincide with this. He was practising for a forthcoming concert and it was lovely to hear some Handel being played inside this beautiful church.

We have a busy year planned with the choir singing as part of the Remembrance Sunday service, leading an all-age service in the spring, and working on Jonah Man Jazz when they'll be joining up with the Bishopton Church Junior Singers for performances at both Bridge of Weir and Bishopton. I am hoping it will be possible to perform again at Bridge of Weir Primary School assemblies too.

Our rehearsals normally begin with a warm-up session (usually led by one of the children). The warm-ups encourage us to warm up our bodies, breathing and voices, then sing some songs covering a wide variety of genres and topics! We try to keep things seasonal and will be looking at music for Harvest, Hallowe'en, Remembrance, and Christmas, we then finish the rehearsals with some sort of musical game. The final activity is to decide which choir member Machar, our mascot, will be going home with for the week. He tends to go home with the child who is the most

attentive, helpful and gives their best effort for the hour long rehearsal. It's a useful method to retain choir members.

FROM THE ORGAN LOFT



Last summer, along with other colleagues, I was made redundant from my role with the Royal School of Church Music. The organisation had got into serious financial difficulties and tough decisions had to be made. The role my colleagues and I had been doing was, in our eyes at least, vital to the organisation. We were more or less responsible for organising activities, looking after a team of local volunteers, engaging with local membership, promoting the RSCM to clergy, organists, musicians, worship leaders, educational institutions in addition to finding out ways how the RSCM could enable the flourishing of church music nationwide. As a result of our redundancies the entire volunteer network (some 330+ local volunteers based the length and breadth of the UK) were also made redundant. The RSCM in one fell swoop had lost connectivity with its members, volunteers and good local knowledge.

RSCM, Alistair Warwick (Director of Scotland: worship leaders, clergy, Music at Holy Trinity Church, Stirling), RSCM Scotland Area Team have Professor George McPhee Leader and now Chair of Church Music Scotland Matthew Beetschen (Director of Music at Dunfermline Abbey) and I felt that church music needed supporting in Scotland. Young people needed to be encouraged to participate in church music – whether through choirs, instrumental groups or organ studies; clergy and worship leaders need help, support and guidance about using music; singers and musicians need opportunities to develop or become involved in something bigger. In fact, what we saw was a window of opportunity. Many of the Scottish volunteers felt the same and were willing to get involved with our plight.

RSCM declined our proposal for Scotland to form its own branch of this organisation, we formed Church Music Scotland, which was dedicated at a special service of Choral Evensong at Dunblane Cathedral during the 1st Church Music Scotland Dunblane Summer School.
